FAIHER BROWN - SERIES 8 - EP 4 THE TOWAR OF LOST SOLLS

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Helmsley Tower looms over the countryside, 20 metres high, a folly built in the form of a castle.

REVEAL the nangled body of a late middle aged NSE DEAD MIN lying crumpled at the base, cordoned off by police rope, an NSE POLICE DOCTOR examining the body, an NSE PHOTOGRAPHER taking pictures, while MALLORY and COODFELLOW look on

MILORY

(glancing up at the tower) Suicide, no doubt.

COOFFILOW We haven't found a note.

MILORY

Not all suicide victima leave behind a note, Sergeant. Who found the body?

Goodfellow gestures to GEORGE ONKLEY - early 50s, in overalls, a little grizzled and unkempt, shy, but amiable.

CODELLOW

Caretaker.

(checking his notes)
George Chkley. Found it when he came to open up. One of the visitors waiting to get in spotted it.

He gestures to NSE POLICE OFFICERS interviewing NSE VISITORS, including NSE BETTY, in her 60s, holding the hand of an NSE OHLD

ALISTAIR HELMSLEY approaches - late 30s, well-groomed and dressed, possessed of a facile charm

ALISTAIR

George...?

GEORGE

Suicide, Sir.

MILORY

And you are?

ALISTAIR

Alistair Helmsley. My family owns the tower.

Mallory and Goodfellowget out of their car, head towards the entrance.

CODELLOW

One thing I found a bit odd - why was the victimwearing a scarf? It's the middle of summer.

MUCRY

(sighs)
It was chilly last night, Sergeant.
I had to wear my long johns.

Suddenly, a CAR pulls up

Atall, suited man gets out, his back towards us.

VALENTINE (COV)
Inspector Mallory?

Millory and Goodfellowturn around

MILORY

Yes?

REVEAL a sharp suited, chisel-javed VALENIINE. He shows them his ID

VALENIINE

Chief Inspector Valentine. Scotland Yard I'm taking over your investigation

Mrs McCarthy sets out tea and sandwiches for Father Brown and Burty.

MRS MICARIHY

Jumped off the top Or naybe pushed

BINIY

What makes you think it could be foul play?

MS MCARIHY

It's always a possibility, isn't it, Father?

FATHER BROWN

I don't think we should jump to conclusions.

BINIY

How do you know all this, Mrs Mr You've been here all morning

MES MICARIHY

Betty McDougal telephoned. She was taking her grandkaughter to visit the tower this marning, when they found the body.

BINIY

That poor man

FATHER BROWN

And his poor family. Did Betty say who it was?

MIS MICARIHY

She tried to get a look at his face...

BINIY

Of course she did

MIS MICARIHY

But the body was too.. disfigured

FATHER BROWN

I'll go to the station after Mass. See what I can find out.

CUT on FAILHER BROWN - troubled

CODELLOW

The victimus wearing a scarf.

MILORY

And as I said...

VALENIINE

(cutting himoff) What colour was it?

CODFELLOW

Red

It means something to Valentine. He looks across at the HELMSLEY HUSE in the distance.

MILORY

Are you going to tell me what's going on, Sir?

Valentine strides back inside, leaving Mallory glaring at a sheepish Goodfellow

ALISTAIR

What brings you back?

VALENIINE

The dead body at the foot of your tower. Reginal d Brody. Father of Philip Brody, your former gardener.

ALISTAIR

Good Lord

VALENIINE

Did any of you have any contact with himrecently?

They shake their heads. Valentine registers George.

VALENTINE (CONT D)

Mf Odd ey?

GEORGE

First I saw of himwas this marning Dead

VALENIINE

You found Natasha Lipinksi's body too

ALISTAIR

What are you insinuating?

VALENIINE

I'mjust stating facts, Mar Helmsley.

EMILY

You're stating coincidences, Chief Inspector.

WILLIAM

(to Valentine)

You don't think it was suicide?

VALENIINE

William isn't it?

(he nods)

Were you here last night?

EMLY

Still living with us - if you can believe that.

Alistair shoots Emily a look

VALENIINE

(to William)

See anything?

WILLIAM

No

ALISTAIR
What evidence do you have of foul play?

VALENTINE
I'mnot at liberty to say.

FMILY
But you think there's a connection between Natasha's nurder and Reginald's death?

VALENTINE
I'm exploring that possibility.

GEORGE You arrested Philip yourself. You saying you made a mistake, Sir?

Valentine - troubled - doesn't ansver.

Valentine stands in front of a board, displaying evidence photos (a strangled Natasha Lipinski, scarf around her neck; Reginald's body, close on the scarf), briefing Mallory and Goodfellow

VALENTINE

... and later sentenced to be hanged - commuted to life inprisonment. Mr Lipinski had recently ended a relationship with him- not amicably, by all accounts - and his scarf was used to strangle her. Now an identical red scarf turns up on his father's body...

Goodfellow gives Mallory a small triumphant look

MALLORY With all due respect, Sir, that's hardly a snoking gun

VALENTINE (CONTI)
(to Mallory / Goodfellow)
I think it's possible that Reginald
Brody was investigating Natasha's
number.

GOODFELLOW
But why now? After all this time?

VALENTINE
(brief hesitation)
His son hanged himself in prison
three weeks ago. I suspect that was
the catalyst.

FATHER BROWN
So he came here to clear his son's name...?

COODFELLOW
... and found something that gothinself killed?

VALENTINE
That's my working theory.

MALLORY

And what about the roof top?

VALENTINE
Admittedly, that's a puzzle.
(looking at Father Brown)
Sealed roof top Sheer drops on
every side. No apparent vay for the
killer to have gotten on or off.
That's up your alley, isn't it,
Father?

FAIHER BROWN

Tell me more.

VALENINE

Inspector. Sergeant. Ask around the clothing shops and narkets in the surrounding area. See if anyone bought a red scarf recently. Father Brown.. you're with ma.

Millary looks outraged, as a delighted Father Brown strolls out with Valentine.

Alistair stares at the tower in the distance, a sober look on his face, when Emily comes over.

EMLY

Don't forget, the local paper are coming over this afternoon to do a profile. Make sure you wear that tie Ibought you This one makes you look too severe. (registering his expressi an)

What's wrong?

ALISTAIR

If Valentine thinks he made a mistake arresting Philip, then who's he going to start suspecting next? One of us.

EMILY

Don't warry about Valentine. We can handle him

OUT on Emily - cold

Father Brown and Valentine stroll along a lane, the tower coming into view in the distance. Father Brown comes to a stop

WIENTINE

You can do it, Father.

FAIHER BROWN

Even looking at it from the ground gives ne vertigo.

VALENTINE

Deep breaths. Don't look down. You'll be fine.

MIS MICARIHY (COV)

Inspector Valentine!

They turn to see Mrs McCarthy approaching holding a shopping basket.

FATHER BROWN

Chief Inspector.

VALENIINE

Mrs McCarthy...

MIS MICARIHY

Are you back in charge at the station?

VALENIINE

Just visiting I'mafraid

MES MICARIHY

(di sappointed)

Oh... Not that there's anything especially wrong with Inspector Mallory, of course - but he doesn't have your... charm

VALENIINE

Mrs McCarthy, if I didn't know better, I'd say you were flirting with me.

She laughs, utterly charmed

MIS MICARIHY

Wall, you must come to dinner at the presbytery. I'll make you my shepherd's pie. And you can meet Penel ope.

VALENIINE

Penel ope?

FATHER BROWN Lady Felicia's niece.

Mallory and Goodfellow pull up in their car, Mallory leaning out of the window

MILORY

A word in private please, Chief Inspector. Unless of course, Mis McCarthy's now a member of your crack squad?

Valentine gives Mrs McCarthy a look, and she heads off.

CODELLOW

We just got back from Hanhleston narket. One of the traders says he sold a red scarf early this norning as he was opening up.

MALLORY
To William Helmsley.

VALENIINE

(to Father Brown, of tower) Looks like you've got a temporary reprieve, Father. (to Mallory / Goodfellow) Let's bring himin

Anxious and agitated, Williamsits on one side of the table d, m f

VALENIINE I can live with that.

BINIY

(to Valentine)
I not the Helmsleys once. They're friends with my parents.

VALENTINE What did you think of them?

BINIY

The brother was a bit odd

VALENIINE

Shell shock. He's been like that since the war.

MIS MICARIHY
So you think he killed that poor nam?

VALENTINE
I' mafraid I can't discuss the case.

MIS MICARIHY
On come on, Chief Inspector. Just a few tidhits.

HUNIY You'd be surprised what we can do

You'd be surprised what we can do when we put our heads together.

VALENIINE

I've no doubt.

MES MICARIHY
It's a shame Father Brown was away Q v C

Valentine smokes a cigarette, gazing at the countryside. Father Brown joins him

VALENIINE

I've missed this. Country air. Open spaces.

FATHER EROAN You should visit more often

Valentine hesitates.

VALENIINE

Reginal d Brody came to see me after I arrested his son Pleaded with me to take another look at the case. I wrote himoff as a desperate parent in denial that his own flesh and blood could we done something so terrible. I've seen hundreds of them And besides, the prosecuting solicitor had already gone ahead with the charges.

FATHER BROWN
So it was out of your hands.

Valentine nods, hesitates.

VALENIINE

It's my worst nightname, putting away the wrong man It's what keeps me up at night.

FAIHER BROWN

It's what makes you a good police officer.

But Valentine looks guilt-ridden

FATHER BROWN (CONTD)
What did William Helmsley have to say?

VALENTINE

Not much But he knows something I think he put that scarf around Reginald's neck to send me a massage - make sure I understood he was nurdered

FATHER BROWN Perhaps I could talk to him?

VALENIINE

Let me try and get himalone first. See what I can get out of him

FAIHER BROWN

You're the boss.

VALENIINE

If you'd said that a bit more back in the day, we might have gotten

in his car, watching the house.

through the window directing NSE STAFF setting seems to authorst the serve transfer of t

VALENTINE
Did your brother kill Natasha
Lipinski?
(Williamdoesnit answer)
Or your sister-in law? Both of
them?

William's eyes widen with horror at something he sees over Valentine's shoulder.

The hand of an unseen assailant raises a broomhandle. It cracks across Valentine's head

He crumples to the ground

MFFLED SOUNDS - a struggle; a gasp of pain; footsteps running away.

THE WILD WING OUT TO BLACK

The SOND of BANGING AT THE DOOR

THE WINLD RETURNS as Valentine opens his eyes... and sees that he's holding a bloody knife.

He pushes himself up - sees William's dead body sprawled a fewfeet away, stabbed in the chest. He drops the knife in horror.

The BANCING CONTINUES. He looks to the door - a chair propped up against the handle.

MALLERY (COV)

Open up! This is the police!

Valentine staggers to his feet. Discriented Scared

The door bursts open, Goodfellow and Mallory chargi /BA a de handle

MILORY

I'msarry, Chief Inspector - I have no choice but to arrest you on suspicion of nurder. Goodfellow..

As Goodfellowcuffs him..

MILCRY (CONT' D)

You are not obliged to say anything unless you wish to do so, but what you say may be put in writing and given in evidence.

OUT on VALENTINE - martified

A car pulls up A SUTED MAN face unseen, gets out, strides into the police station..

Father Brown sits with Valentine, who stems the blood from his head wound with a handlerchief.

FATHER BROWN

Fxil?

VALENIINE

Said Natasha "sawbehind the curtain". Found some sort of room He was gorma tell me more...

FATHER BROWN

But the killer silenced himand framed you...

VALENDA

In exactly the same way they staged Reginal d'Brody's suicide.

The door opens. Goodfellowlets Mallory and Sullivan into the room

MILORY

(to Father Brown) w Aact hiec anedr What are you doing here?

CODELLOW

Spiritual counsel, Sir.

Mallary scoffs. Coodfellowheads off.

FAIHER BROAND Jan.. Chief Inspector f fi NecCRY

MILORY

(to Sullivan)

The door was barricaded. There was no other way on or off the roof. Not to mention, the bloody knife has his fingerprints all over it.

Sullivan examines the dressed wound on Valentine's head

SULL VAN

(to Mallary)

And this?

MILORY

Sustained during the struggle, I expect.

VALENIINE

The killer hit me frombehind

SULL VAN

(to Mallary)

No other way on or off the roof?

MILORY

Not unless the killer could fly.

SULL VAN

(beat)

I'mtaking over this investigation Father Brown.. you're with me.

Delighted, Father Brown heads out with Sullivan, leaving Mallory outraged

CECRCE (COV) Can I help you?

They both turn to see George energing onto the roof. Sullivan shows himhis ID

Father Brown and Sullivan come down the stairwell (Sullivan carrying the broom), and into the exhibition area, Sullivan wiping bird droppings from his shoulder. George follows them

ŒŒ

Anything else I can do for you, Sir, my lodgings are next to the main house.

SULLIVAN
That'll be all for now

George shuffles out.

SULLIVAN (CONTD)

Not even an hour in Kenhaleford and already my tailored suit has been blemished with bird muck.

FATHER BROWN

FATHER BROWN - S8 EPN BR VMP EMANS 8PE

Alistair sits on the sofa, by the telephone, staring into space - a haunted look on his face.

EMILY (COX)

Drit murn him

She cames into the room, goes over, stands in front of him

EMILY (CONT D

He was weak. Something like this was bound to happen sooner or later.

ALISTAIR

He wasn't weak. He was... traumatised. He didn't deserve that.

EMILY

Valentine'll pay for your brother's death But for now you need to put aside your personal grief and think about the future. Our future.

She notices a piece of paper in his hand - a guest list with contact details.

EMILY (CONTD)
What are you doing with that?

ALISTAIR

I was going to phone the guests. Cancel the -

EMILY

What did I just say?

ALISTAIR

How's that going to look? Two deaths in two days - one of themny brother - and we're throwing a party?

EMLY

A fundraiser. For war veterans - just like your brother.

ALISTAIR

It'll make me look callous.

EMLY

It will make you look strong Like you're putting the needs of the namy over your own personal grief...

She gets closer, lifts his face towards her so that he meets her gaze. She caresses his face.

SULI VAN

The killer climbed down the outside of the building

MILORY

Qinbed?

SULL VAN

And according to the coroner's report, Reginal d Brody was already dead when he was thrown off the tower - likely from an injury to the back of the head.

(as Goodfellowshows

Valentine in)

... which I think we can safely say confirms Chief Inspector Valentine's initial suspicions.

VALENTINE

Music to my ears. Who do I have to thank?

SULL VAN

I'll brief you in Inspector Mallory's office... if you don't mind, Inspector?

MILORY

(through gritted teeth) Be my guest.

They head towards the office. Sullivan stops, turns back

SULLIVAN

Father, since you've proved yourself useful thus far... why don't you join us?

MUCRY

(aside to Goodfellow) Way not just deputise himand give hima badge?

FAILER BROWN

(overhearing) A badge would be nice.

SULL VAN

Dan't push your luck, Father.

VALENIINE

I'll see what I can do

Valentine gives Father Brown a wink, as they head into Mallory's office. Mallory fumes - then follows them

Sullivan and Valentine stand in front of the evidence board, engaged in argument, the others gathered in the office.

SULL VAN

Where not sending in civilians to carry out an illegal search...

VALENIINE

They want be doing an illegal search They'll be going to a fundraising party - and if they happen to stumble on something...

SULIVAN "Hippen to studde"?

FATHER BROWN

I often do

VALENIINE
... they report it to us...

SULLIVAN It would be inadmissable.

VALENIINE

They'll be guests at a party.
(to Father Brown)
Your friend - Bunty - she said her parents know the Helmsleys. She could wrangle some invites, couldn't she?

FATHER BROWN

I've no doubt.

VALENIINE

(to Sullivan)
See? It has nothing to do with us.

SULL VAN

It'll have everything to do with us if we've sent them there.

VALENTI NE

No one has to know that.

SULL VAN

Are you suggesting we falsify our report?

Father Brown discreetly slips out of the room Goodfellow's the only one who notices himleave.

VALENTINE

We need to find the roomthat Williamwas trying to tell me about. We don't have enough evidence for a warrant. This is the only way.

MILORY

I'm with Chief Inspector Sullivan There have been quite enough anateurs involved in this case as it is.

SULIVAN

Inspector Millory has a point.

CODFELLOW

(glances out the door, trying to their attention)

Sirs...

SULLIVAN

... we can't send civilians into a potentially dangerous situation...

VALENIINE

Father Brown can take care of himself...

CODELLOW

Sirs...

SULLIVAN

And I want be held responsible...

VALENIINE

Then hold me responsible...

CODELLOW

SIRS!

They fall silent. Goodfellow gestures into reception..

CODFELLOW CONT D

(to the detectives)

Father Brown...

Father Brown's at the front desk, on the phone. The others all peer out of the door of Mallory's office.

FATHER BROWN (to phone)
Thank you, Bunty... Splendid

He hangs up, turns to the others.

SULLIVAN What did you just do?

Father Brown gives thema sheepish look

The gang wander down the hall way, peeking into rooms, opening cupboards...

Father Brown turns on the light.

The decor is cosy and warm-but as they survey the room a look of horror dawns on Father Brown and Mrs McCarthy's faces.

We see a PORIRAIT of EDMIND HEIMSLEY (Alistair's father), and draped above it a red flag with a circle in the centre, a lightening bolt across it.

We catch glimmses of books on the shelves - "Beyond Good and Evil" by Nietzsche, "Selected Prose" by Ezra Pound, "Secrets of the Federal Reserve" by Fustace Millins, "Imperium by Francis Parker Yockey.

On the reading table is a copy of The Greater Britain by Great Misley.

BUNIY Waat's that flag?

FATHER BROWN
The Union Movement.

Burty looks confused

MIS MICARIHY
Don't you ever read the newspapers,
Penel ope?

FAILER BROWN
It's a political party - the successor to the British Union of Fascists. They share the same flag

MAS MICARIHY And the same vile beliefs.

BLNIY Maybe we should go

FATHER BROWN

Agreed

But suddenly the door closes. A key turns in the lock

ELNIY
I had to climb through the window

EMILY
Burty, lovely to see you I'm sure whatever happened is an impocent mistake. Probably one of our staff...

VALENIINE

(to Burty) Wiere's the room?

BINIY

I'll showyou

They all follow Burty - Alistair and Emily exchanging a nervous look

Father Brown and Mis McCarthy watch the door expectantly,! roll the door

VALENIINE

Even so, it wouldn't help your political career if this got out, would it? Your family having fascist leanings?

EMLY

My husband just told you We're not fascists.

VALENIINE

People would say you were.

SULLIVAN

Sounds like notive to me.

EMLY

You don't have a single shred of evidence that either one of us -

But Valentine isn't listening. He's noticed a row of sports trophies on the nantelpiece. Studies them

VALENIINE

(to Alistair)

These yours?

ALISTAIR

My school trophies. For all his flaws, he was still a father, proud of his son

VALENIINE

(picking up a trophy)
You're a climber?

ALISTAIR

So?

SULL VAN

Our killer has a head for heights.

VALENIINE

(to Alistair)

I' marresting you on suspicion of nurder...

EMILY

What?!

VALENIINE

You are not obliged to say anything

EMILY (to Alistair) I'll telephone Julian Don't say anything until he gets there.

Emily follows Sullivan, Valentine and Alistair out of the room

Father Brown notices a framed photograph on the nantelpiece, his browfurrowing. He picks it up, studying it. It's an CLD ARMY PHOTO of Edward Helmsley posing with other soldiers. An inscription reads "Parachute Regiment".

MIS MICARIHY Vidat is it, Father?

FAIHER BROWN Maybe nothing

He puts the photo back, then heads out.

BUNIY Watere are you going?

FATHER BROWN Want be long

He heads out.

Valentine and Sullivan sit across from Alistair and his NSE Solicitor.

ALISTAIR

We didn't have the sign on the door back then - but Natasha took it upon herself to find the master key and go in Came out sobbing Accusing us of being Nazis. Ran out of the house. And that's it. The last I saw of her... alive.

VALENIINE

Why didn't you tell me this back when I first investigated?

ALISTAIR

For obvious reasons.

SULLWAND q od you, we're not-o SULLI' You didn't want anyone to know of your fascist affiliations?

ALISTAIR

We told you, we're not fascists.

VALENIINE

Then vhy did your brother think you had something to do with the deaths?

ALISTATE

William's always thought I killed Natasha - even after Hilip was convicted Thought I silenced heo a

Emily shows guests out the door, while Millory and Goodfellow

Father Brown snoops around the caretaker's station - comprising a small desk, chair, cleaning and maintenance

Apprehensively, Father Brown heads up the stairs.

George takes the rope ladder - and the boat pole - then follows him

George pushes open the door to the roof platform

GFORGE

After you, Father.

Father Brown stares outside. Terrified George prods himwith the shears. Father Brown steps outside.

George slings the rope ladder over the wall, propping the boat hook next to it. Putting down the shears, he closes the door, and wedges a chair against the handle.

CECRCE (CONT D

To the edge.

Father Brown goes to the edge.

GEORGE (CONT D

Now j ump

Father Brown doesn't move.

CECRCE (CONT D

It'll be easier if you jump, but I'll throwyou over myself if I have to

Father Brown forces himself to look down. His breath comes in quick rasps. He looks up to the sky. His breathing calms. He looks back down. And turns around...

FATHER BROWN

You killed them to protect a secret. But that secret's been exposed

GEORGE

What are you talking about?

FATHER BROWN

The police have seen the room Alistair's been arrested

George takes this in

GEORGE

(to himself) I failed him

FATHER BROWN

And what of the three lives you took? Do they mean nothing?

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I made a promise.

FATHER BROWN

To kill?

GEORGE

(with rising passion)
To protect the family name. To see themrise to power. To make this country pure.

He stares at Father Brown with fire in his eyes. Father Brown studies him

FATHER BROWN

William told Chief Inspector Valentine that the Hilmsleys were evil. But in my experience meeting people who feel the way you do - it's not evil I see. It's fear...

GFORGE

I'mnot afraid

FATHER BROWN

Fear of anyone who isn't like them Fear of themselves. Fear that the world's changing too fast. Fear that their lives have no meaning (George really listening

Desperate for a scapegoat. And it always breaks my heart that their capacity for seeing the humanity in others - for seeing their souls could be so . . limited

Choked up, Father Brown holds George's gaze, baring his emotions to him And we see in George's face a glimmer of genuine humanity - of empathy.

The numerit broken by FIERCE BANGING AT THE DOOR

MALLO as g 'e'eotoeaatt Le. And ve

Millory and George grapple. George pushes himback towards the railing bending himbackwards over the edge - when suddenly a SHOT rings out, a bullet tearing through George's shoulder. He lets go of Millory, who crumples to the floor.

VALENTINE

MILORY

And may I say, it's been a pleasure working with the both of you...

Mallory pastes on a smile.

CODELLOW

Nothing like ending the day on a victory.

Valentine reacts with a look of quiet unease at Goodfellow's words. Father Brown registers it.

Millary and Goodfellowhead off.

SULL VAN

(to Valentine)
I'll see you at the Yard

VALENTINE

(shaking his hand) Thank you, Chief Inspector.

SULL VAN

Till next time, Father.

Sullivan strides out.

(gesturing to a bench)

VALENIINE

They sit on the bench, catching their breaths.

A beat.

VALENIINE (CONT D

It wasn't much of a victory, was it? Three deaths. And my mistake that led to all of it.

FATHER BROWN

It was George Caldley's famaticism that led to all of it.

VALENIINE

I put away the wrong man, Father. I'll have to live with that.

FATHER BROWN

(beat)

Yes, you will. But know you're a good man. A man of conscience. You wouldn't feel the way you do if it wasn't so.

VALENTINE

Thank you, Father... Which reminds no...

(fishing something out of his pocket) Little gift.

He hands Father Brown a small wrapped package. Father Brown opens it, revealing a toy police badge.

VALENTINE (CONT D)
Even had it engraved

Father Brown turns it over, revealing the inscription "Father
